Beloved in Christ:

Greetings in the precious name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

— Matthew 2:10-12, NRSV

When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the

brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way.

As we continue to journey in the season of Epiphany, we can't help but be amazed by how God used Magi to make a manifestation of Christ to the world; I am always intrigued to see how the Magi yielded to the guidance of the Triune God, given their professional knowledge.

God of the Epiphany continues to move in our midst giving us "aha or Epiphany moments!" The challenge for all of us is to catch these moments and use them to glorify our Creator God, filled with the love of Jesus Christ, and empowered by the Holy Spirit.

Needless to say, God's Epiphany moments come to us through many sources — when we read the Word of God, sing hymns, or listen to the witness of a family member, preacher, teacher, colleague, or friend in person or even through social media. Yes, it may even come from a person who is not a friend or well-wisher. The question is, like the Magi, do we see the hand of God in those moments and seize those opportunities to extend the Reign of God in this universe as faithful disciples of Jesus Christ?

One of the Epiphany moments that I experienced came through an email: a hymn composed by Rev. Carolyn Winfrey Gillette, based on the Lectionary Reading, just this past Sunday.

They Raged at Jesus' Sermon

LLANGLOFFAN 7.6.7.6 D ("Lead On, O King Eternal") They raged at Jesus' sermon in Jesus' own hometown, For in the things he taught them, he turned life upside down; It wasn't just their neighbors who knew God's love and grace; For Jesus said God favors the ones we don't embrace. God saved a foreign widow and rescued her from drought, For when she helped Elijah, God also helped her out. In Naaman, God's own favor to others was revealed; Though many locals suffered, that Syrian was healed. In this world's noise and clatter, too often values shift; We say Christ's words don't matter and throw them off a cliff.

We push aside the stranger, we walk right by the poor, We disregard the prisoner and say we matter more. O God, your love is wider than we can comprehend; You reach to the outsider and call the stranger "friend." In Christ you gave a message transcending time and place May we your church have courage to share your love and grace. There are many Epiphany moments in the words of this hymn; it is my hope and prayer that as we continue to journey in the season of Epiphany and beyond, that we will ask ourselves these questions, and that you will compose your own questions in your journey to Christian discipleship.

In these challenging times, when we hear a sermon, are we content with a sugar-coated message designed to please our egos, or do we yearn for words that will turn our lives upside down?

Do we believe God's grace extends to people who are not on our friend list — as Jesus reminds us, it was God who saved a foreign widow and Naaman?

How do we make Christ's words matter through our actions and deeds, even when the world around us is saying to us they do not matter?

What are some of the concrete things we may do in our lives as baptized Christians, particularly in light of these words?

O God, your love is wider than we can comprehend; You reach to the outsider and call the stranger "friend." In Christ you gave a message transcending time and place May we your church have courage to share your love and grace. May God's grace, power, and love be with all of us as we reflect on these questions and others.

Being the Church

From talking to other congregants, I've found that for many of us, going to church on Sunday was our only contact with "church"- a room in a building. "Church" didn't happen between the Sundays. Over the 32 years I've been a part of FCC, mainline Christian churches have intentionally moved closer to how the early church functioned: the Book of Acts tells us how the early followers of Jesus travelled from community to community, growing the church through **preaching** and **actively serving within each community**.

From Matt Dabbs, preaching minister of Auburn (Alabama) Church of Christ:

"The move is from seeing church as a location where we do certain things, to an *identity*. It is less about ritual and more about relationship. Jesus didn't say "Go into all the world and gather for an hour a week in large rooms apart from everyone else." [Instead he sent out those on the inside (the disciples) to help those on the outside to understand God's nature, and develop a sustaining relationship with God. (Matthew 28:16-20)]

"Doing" church says:

We get people "to the church" and hope they learn something from someone (Pastor) that will help them learn about God. "Being" church says

Because we are the church we are not inviting people to a location to "do church". Instead we are inviting them to be among the church (that is, the people) in order for them to see an alternative to the world they live in. The move is form seeing church as a location where we do certain things to an *identity*. It is less about ritual and more about relationship. It is less about talk and more about action."

Our ministry program **Connecting in the Spirit** centers on teaching our children (and reminding ourselves) how to "be the church", in order to make a life-sustaining difference in their lives, our own lives and in our world. We invite you to pray for this ministry, and for your place within it.

Sometimes it is just nice to know who you are helping at the Community Survival Center. I received a call from a man who had lost his job and whose fridge was empty. He had a family of five and needed some help. He said that he was embarrassed to even ask about getting food from our Emergency Food Pantry. When I explained the paperwork needed and told him how many times he could come to the Pantry he said, "I just need help this one time." He said again that he never thought he would need this kind of assistance. I told him that he shouldn't be afraid to ask for help as that is exactly why we are here.

Everybody needs help at some point and we are just glad that we can provide that help. And we provide that help thanks to the

generosity of our donors. Last year, you contributed 98,631 lbs. of food for us to distribute in the Pantry. Wow!

A family of five is given just over 100 lbs. of food in bagged groceries. Each household receives three frozen meat items and enough food to last for eight days

You Are Invited to "Brave Space Conversations"

The United Methodist Denomination is in the midst of a "divorce." Facing a proposed denominational separation, many United Methodists expect big decisions ahead about where they will make their church home.

The proposed split comes after decades of intensifying debate over LGBTQ inclusion. Now the question before many: Do they want to stay with The United Methodist Church or seek out an alternative?

The NE Vision Forward Team was created at the June 2021 Annual Conference session (with 91 percent approval) in order "to advance the strategic imagination and mission for the New England Conference."

The team has learned that there is a severe lack of trust and need for healing in the New England Conference. The Vision Forward Team and the Delegation to the General & Jurisdictional Conferences invite all members of the New England Conference to these Brave Space Conversations (town halls) as an opportunity for us begin healing, build trust, and renew our mission.

Three identical sessions (plan to attend one) will take place at 6:30 pm on Jan 24, Feb 7, and Feb 28 via Zoom. These meetings are called, "Brave Space Conversations" on the Future of the New England Conference"
