From the Pastor's Desk.

For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call on me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you. You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart. I will be found by you," declares the LORD, ..."

Jeremiah 31: 11-14a

Greetings in the Name of Christ!

We are just coming to the end of the Easter season. During sermons this season, I have talked about seeing signs of the Risen Christ in our daily life. For many of us, we are like the disciples of Luke's writing on the road to Emmaus. The Risen Christ comes and walks with disciples, but they do not recognize him. We often do not recognize God's presence in our lives. Finally, as the disciples approach home, they invite the Risen Christ to stay with them. At dinner, he breaks bread, the disciple's eyes are open, and they recognize Jesus. (Read Luke 24:13-35 for the full account).

First, the scripture tells us that hospitality counts. If they had not invited the Risen Christ to stay with them, he would not have had the opportunity to break bread and the disciples' eyes would not have "been opened." Signs of the Risen Christ surround humanity, but we do not see them. God, in Jesus, loves people and wants to have a relationship. God speaks to us regularly, trying to get our attention. There are several reasons for not being able to see them. First, we move so fast that we do not take time to observe our

surroundings. Second, we just do not look. Third, we lack the faith to name and claim that it is the Risen Christ. We might think there was a sign or something mysterious happened that we cannot explain, and we believe for a fleeting moment, but then we wonder if people will think we are crazy if we name it as such. Our doubts creep in and we try not to think about it. Other times, we remember the sign or experience, but we still are silent. Not to sure about sharing our belief out loud.

We have been seeking God's guidance and intentionally taking steps in faith over the last few years: working with Ministry Architects, sponsoring seasonal programs, and a new healing

program, to begin this summer. (More news on this to follow.) During this Easter season, a robin has made her nest in the wreath on the back door. We have had the wreath up for the past few years, but this year, we have a nest with new life in four eggs ready to burst forth. For a few of us at church, this is a sign from



God, letting us know that the future of the church might look quite different than it has in the past, but that God is with us, and new life abounds for us!

We are entering Pentecost on June 5th. Pentecost is the birth of the church, when the Holy Spirit descended upon the disciples and they were no longer fearful, but full of faith. Those who had hid behind locked doors after Jesus had been crucified, now full of the Spirit, stood up in front of those who ridiculed them as being drunk, and proclaimed boldly the Risen Christ. (Read Acts 2) May we seek God, be open to the Holy Spirit to fill our cup to overflowing, and my we boldly walk forward choosing faith over our fears! May we be confident enough to share our sightings of the Risen Christ with others.

On Pentecost Sunday, you are invited to wear red to symbolize the Holy Spirit arriving among us. Yes, Holy Spirit, come upon and into me and enflame my heart with your Spirit.

From the Deacons' Bench

Sparrows

Matthew 10:29-31 The Living Bible

Not one sparrow (What do they cost? Two for a penny?) can fall to the ground without your father knowing it. And the very hairs of your head are all numbered. So don't worry! You are more valuable to him than many sparrows.

As I was driving down Somers Rd. in East Longmeadow the other day, I saw a cloud of birds come swooping down not far above traffic, an unusual sight. As I got closer I saw there were a dozen or so small birds being chased by a large hawk. In the split-second that it took my brain to record this and prompt me to gasp at the sight, the flock suddenly wheeled around and, turning together, began chasing their pursuer. In a flash, the hawk turned and was gone from my range of vision, chased by his intended prey.

I had to keep moving with traffic, but I was so moved by this glimpse of the workings of the natural world. What a blessing for me! In that first sight I was sure I would see the hawk grab one of the birds- there were so many of them, how could he miss? I never considered an alternative scenario, and am still deeply moved: How did those small birds know to work together and turn on their attacker? How did they know their strength would be far greater together? Science tells us this defensive mechanism in these small birds would have evolved over time - but how did this arise in the first place? What caused their birdy behavior to change, and to turn and go on the attack for the first time?


I keep wondering: Is there a lesson here? Do I recognize when my welfare is threatened? Do I know when to change my behavior for my welfare? Do I recognize when working as part of my "flock", will provide the best outcome?

Often (very often!) I have found in retrospect that, without even being conscious of it, I have been holding on to faith that the Creator will uphold me and guide me, even when my faith is weak-or even absent. Even within my doubt, something within me holds on to Jesus' words, "You are more valuable to him than many sparrows."
