From the Pastor's Desk

Greetings in the Name of Christ!

Many of you know that I am taking six weeks off, beginning July 1st for rest and renewal.: two weeks of vacation time and four weeks of renewal. While I have been serving for only four years at FCC in Hampden, my last time of renewal was in 2010. The United Methodist recommends pastors take off an extra four weeks every four years and a sabbatical of three months every twelve years. I am due.

My time away will be taken during my favorite season of the year, I will not squander the hours. Yes, there will be time at the beach, campfires, gardening, and with friends, but I also have a list of readings and courses to take which will fill and restore my cup. I hope to recapture my daily meditation of centering prayer, which I have let slip away.

The last four years have been challenging. I hoped to bring new energy and excitement as we focused on rebuilding the church.

The threats of COVID sidetracked many plans as we focused on simply maintaining; trying to stay connected as we were instructed through the government and denominations to stay apart. Preaching to a camera is hard. There is no feedback of laughter, or smiles, heads shaking in support or disagreement; just a hope that somehow the Spirit will touch those who are willing to listen on a computer screen.

During the past year, we created a RENO team to help implement some new ideas, build relationships with folks in the community, and reconnect our own church members. It has taken a lot of time and energy for many of us on the team. What is challenging and defeating is to invest so much into planning events and opportunities and to have so little congregational participation or involvement. Many of the events we are holding are opportunities to invite new folks, but also an opportunity to simply be together as a church community in something beyond worship.

On July 30th and August 27th, we will be hosting community events. Beginning at 5:00 PM, we will offer a free meal of hotdogs and burgers followed by fun entertainment: Big Joe the Storyteller and a Comedy & Magician show. It is good fun for all ages. I hope you will plan on attending: laughing, eating, sharing, and simply being together. It is a sign of support and encouragement to those who have worked to put the programs together.

Church will continue each Sunday. We will worship outdoors, weather permitting, except for July 3rd, which will be in the sanctuary. We will have various guest worship leaders. Please show up. It is a sign of hospitality and support. Christ is counting on YOU as you are counting on CHRIST.

I have almost completed my first "Liturgical Year" at Hampden Community Church. I started on Advent One and we just celebrated Pentecost a few weeks ago. That covers all of the 'seasons.' I like the seasons of the church year. I find the rhythm reassuring as it mimics our trip around the sun. These past couple of years have felt dis-jointed and 'out-of-whack' because of the relentless Covid virus and all its ramifications. The evening news doesn't provide much comfort. I need some consistency, some predictability. I long for order amidst the chaos and somehow, observing the seasons of the church reminds me that God has been my help in ages past and is my hope for years to come.

We are now in yet another season, one not marked on the liturgical calendar but widely recognized in northern hemisphere churches as "Summer Worship" This is characterized by outdoor worship services, lemonade on the lawn, flip flops, guest preachers, and tanned soloists; all in all, not too bad a time. It's also that time when a combined July/ August Newsletter compels us to start thinking aboutgasp!....September. It seems like a long way off but let's plant a few seeds anyway.

*I would like to begin a Junior Choir program. We will start in late September. It will be on Saturday mornings from 10-11 AM. glorify God. While we want to make it the best it can be; it is never a performance. If you've entertained the idea of lending your talents to a Church Choir, this is the time to do it. Besides, it's kinda fun.

*Scantic River Drummers - the surprise of the millennium (so far) has much support and interest. Anyone can drum. It's meditative and relaxing, one can get lost in "the zone" even for a few moments. Often, after we've all been drumming for a 5 or 10 minute stretch; we'll stop, we'll look at each other and say, "That was a good one." We have been meeting on Tuesday nights at 7:00 PM but that's also a big meeting night at the church. An alternative time might serve the effort better. Stay tuned. (see what I did there....'tuned'....get it?)

It is said that, "Those who sing, pray twice." I think I might add that those who make music for the glory of our Lord are blessed thrice. Once because your music gladdens the hearts of the worshipping community. Twice, because you are sharing your gifts and talents with the universe, and thrice, because God loves it. Indeed, it is good to give God thanks and praise.

Enjoy your Summer. Don't forget to come to church. Remember to think about singing, ringing, drumming, children's choir and please keep it all in your prayers.



A Message from the National Officers of the United Church of Christ

The national officers of the United Church of Christ are speaking out against the U.S. Supreme Court decision eliminating, after almost 50 years, the constitutional right to an abortion.

Long before the Supreme Court decision in Roe v. Wade, the United Church of Christ, by action of the General Synod, affirmed the right of every individual to follow their personal religious and moral convictions regarding their reproductive healthcare. We continue to stand by this conviction today. This religious and moral agency includes the autonomy of birthing people to decide whether to complete or terminate a pregnancy.

Our Synod resolutions, which represent the will of the church in light of scripture, highlight the importance of ensuring access to the full range of reproductive health care regardless of race, religion, or economic status. We do not take this stand in spite of faith, but rather because of it. Throughout sacred text humankind is tasked with care of self and others. Bodily autonomy is a human right given by God.

Today's Supreme Court decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, discarding nearly 50 years of precedent, will endanger the lives and well-being of birthing people who do not choose to continue pregnancy. God loves and cares for people who have abortions, and so does the United Church of Christ. We believe all people have the right to make their own decisions about their bodies and medical treatment. We believe women have an inalienable right to shape the direction of their lives as they see fit, and no institution established by humankind should supersede such freedom.


The Supreme Court's decision to vacate Roe v. Wade and return the protection of a woman's human right to states represents a continual effort to oppress women and people who can give birth. Such uniform repression targeted at one specific class of people, namely those who have a uterus, creates yet another stark division in a country that so desperately needs unity. In addition to gender bias, such a rendering also disproportionately effects birthing people of color and women in rural or low-income areas who face challenges in access to safe and medically supervised reproductive health care, including abortions. The gravity of this decision and the devastation of its impact cannot be overstated.

Through the prophet Isaiah, God offers these words of comfort to the Israelites during a challenging time: "So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." (Isaiah 41:10) These are not words that assuage us with easy answers and shallow promises. There is no declaration that things will be better tomorrow. They will not be. But they do promise that we are not alone in our struggles.

We, the officers of the United Church of Christ, want those feeling the pain of today's decision to know that you are not alone. God has not abandoned you and neither will we. We will do what we always do when the law loses its love. We will grieve with you and offer space for lament and mourning. We will work with you until the rights of every person are honored in this land. We will stand with you in protest. We will kneel with you in prayer. And we will maintain our commitment to educate people about abortion access and safe medically supported reproductive healthcare. Now and always, we remain firm in the knowledge that all are beloved of God, and this cause is right and holy.
