From the Pastor's Desk

O little town of Bethlehem, How still we see Thee lie Above Thy deep and dreamless sleep, The silent stars go by Yet in thy dark streets shineth, The everlasting light The hopes and fears of all the years, Are met in Thee tonight Brooks and Redner, 1968

Greetings of Grace and Peace!

I love music, and I truly love Christmas songs and hymns. We normally start playing Christmas tunes in our home around Thanksgiving and continue well into January. They fill me with joy, hope, and happiness. Of course, almost any music can be helpful and healing. The notes and chords resonating within our bodies at the cellular level, causing cells to vibrate and let loose those germs, hurts, and wounds which are trying to hang on and find a home within us. The songs reconnect me with memories of Christmas past. I am amazed at how I remember so many of the words to the songs, even as I age, and memory is becoming more challenging.

As I played the song, *O Little Town of Bethlehem*, I was struck by the last two lines in the first verse (see above). As you may have remembered last month, I spoke about being in a *"fog of gloom."* While the writing of my blessings each day last month did help to lift me, I am still challenged as I listen to the daily news to be sustained. But then the words of hope that are expressed in the last two lines of the song spoke to me as I listened to the song. I had to look up all the lyrics so pay attention to them. My hope is in the Lord, who came at Christmas and comes to me every day, over and over, offering me hope that shines amid my gloom. Christ's light is not only for today's new worries, but for all the hurts, fears, and more accumulated personally and as a society over the years. Christ is the answer! Following the ways Jesus modeled for us to live and die is how we bring God's kin-dom here on earth.

As I read the lyrics of the song, I was struck by the prayer of the last verse. (Of course, the word hymn is translated as a sung prayer, so the entire song is a prayer.) My spiritual practice this month will be to repeat, in word and/or song, the last verse of "O Little Town of Bethlehem," daily.

O Holy Child of Bethlehem, Descend to us, we pray Cast out our sin and enter in, Be born in us today We hear the Christmas angels, The great glad tidings tell O come to us, abide with us, Our Lord Emmanuel

My prayer will be to cast out the sin, individually and collectively. So, I invite you to join me in this month's spiritual practice of repeating the last verse of this song daily as a prayer. But I challenge you to not only repeat it with words but to sing it. Don't worry about it being sounding good. God looks at our hearts, so if we sing it prayerfully, even off key, we will be blessed to find the true gift of Christmas living within.

Visits with Joyce (this note was sent to us from Molly and Gill, good friends of Steve Libby's in Vermont)

When we think about Joyce Stillman Libby and her rich and productive life, several visits we had with her come to mind and illustrate her interest in other people, their lives and past, and her remarkable ability to recall. In great detail, her own story.

Joyce was engaging and eager to be involved. So much so that while visiting a house Steve was building for friends in Huntington, she climbed a tall ladder with a bucket of soapy water and newspaper, and washed the newly hung windows. She had made promising progress by the time Steve saw her leaning and scrubbing from her perch many feet in the air! Steve urged Joyce to come down, carefully. Story has it that Joyce said "But look how much more sunshine you have inside. I'll get down in a minute. I'm almost finished!" Joyce wanted to contribute and like to work.

For many years Gill and I attended Hunter's Breakfast with Steve and Jane. It is a humble affair hosted by the town women of Starksboro. It is held in an iconic white clapboard building in the foothills of the Green Mountains above the town village. On a brisk October morning while Joyce was visiting Vermont, we all drove the hilly back roads to attend the town breakfast. I remember Joyce's delight when we parked the car and she realized we would be eating in what was once a one-room schoolhouse. She embarked on stories about the schools she attended as a child growing up in Michigan.

The Starksboro Hunter breakfast is an abundant spread of pancakes, local syrup, eggs toast and homemade jams, muffins and dark coffee. With toasters popping, bacon sizzling, and people chatting the room was alive with a cacophony of voices. Joyce lit up as we stepped inside, delighted with everything from steamed up windows to families assembled at long tables, and with us, warmly welcomed by those seated and others serving, Joyce immediately struck up a conversation with the man in suspenders sitting across from us.

Joyce experienced a different morning meal on another of her visits to Vermont; one Steve organized and appropriately named 'Grannies Breakfast'. Gill's mother Peg Barlow and my mother Jane McClaskey were staying with us the same weekend Joyce was overnighting with Steve and Jane. Steve thought a visit among the three grandmothers would be something special and valued by all. And it was. There was no lack of conversation around the table. Joyce enjoyed Peg who was equally famous for recollecting and retelling stories. My mother Jane, a listening sort, laughed and got a word in every once in a while. The threesome liked the food, but reminiscing was clearly the best part. It was a memorable morning for all.

It's hard to believe that it was five years ago when our church family was asked to decide if we would like to support a full or part-time minister. Pastor Pat's current full-time appointment ends on June 30, 2023. If we want to have another minister appointed from the Methodist Foundation, we will need to notify them as soon as possible. We will be discussing our options at our Church Meeting on December 18, 2022 at the end of our church service. (About 11:00)

We are thankful to the Methodist Foundation for their \$53,000.00 support of Pastor Pat's salary. Our current pledge drive has begun and we will have a better idea as to our projected income for next year by the time of this church meeting. When we planned last year's budget, we knew there was a budget deficit of \$51,000. We are fortunate that several of our former church members had made gifts to the church – some are "designated fund" where the donor has said what the money could be used for and other monies were given with no restrictions.

Another factor affecting our future income is the fact that in the past five years 51 funerals have been held for friends and members of our church.
