From the Pastor's Desk

Read Psalm 55

Lord, confuse the wicked, confound their words, for I see violence and strife in the city. Day and night they prowl about on its walls; malice and abuse are within it. Destructive forces are at work in the city; threats and lies never leave its streets.

Psalm 55: 9-11

Greetings!

I wish I could start this letter in my normal greeting of "Grace and Peace to you." But I am upset! I am angry! I am sad! I hope you are as well.

Let me explain. By now, I am sure you have heard that there was another shooting in a school in Nashville, Tennessee. This is the 89^h school shooting as of March 27th, 2023, and the 130th mass shooting in the USA as of the same date. A mass shooting is defined as, where at least four people are shot and injured or killed, not including the person who fired the gun. The six people killed in Nashville included three in their 60's and three students, one is eight years old and two are nine. I have children that are eight and nine! I cannot imagine the pain, the anger, the despair! School is a place to learn, to make and be with friends, to develop trusting relationships beyond their parents. Parents, students,

teachers, town officials, community members assume this will be a safe setting. However, with 89 school shootings as of March 27th, that is about 1.5 school shooting per day. Enough already, ENOUGH!

This is not the first time I am upset about a school shooting with innocent folks being killed. It is not that I am unaware of the constitution guaranteeing the right to bear arms. I am aware that mental health issues are behind most shootings. But this morning, was the first time I heard a thorough explanation provided by Dr. John "Jay" Wellons, III, M.D., M.S.P.H., professor of neurosurgery and pediatrics, chief of pediatric neurosurgery, and vice chair for clinical research for the Section of Surgical Sciences at Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt about the extent of the damage done by AK 12 and AK 15 rifles. He shared that as the information came to the hospital on Monday about the Nashville School shooting, be took his position in the emergency room, prepared to assist as he is educated and trained. Unfortunately, the results of being shot with an AK 12 or AK 15, destroy such a large portion of the body, as the large and fast-moving bullet expands as it goes through the body, leaving very little to work with. He was unable to save lives.

As he described the extent of damage, my anger began to rise. Questions and thoughts came: Why are we allowing sales of AK 12 and AK 15 to those outside of the military? Hunting with one of these does not seem like it is a sport or a hunt for food, but more of complete destruction, a display of violence and anger. Where is the money in the budget for those with mental illness? Why is the church not more vocal about this?

Then, I thought of a note I re-discovered as I was beginning to pack up my office pending my upcoming retirement. The note had indicated I shouldn't speak about social justice issues. The author didn't want to hear about world or social issues as they had enough problems at home. Christian faith calls us to be concerned about others! To love others as ourselves. Those children shot in the school could be ours. The teacher, janitor, principal, or police could be one of us. The shooter could be one of our children and needs to know where they can find help. We are the church and need to be aware and engaged in the world. Jesus modeled being inclusive (ex. Luke 13:10-17), and he sent out his disciples (us!) in pairs for ministry (Luke 10:1-24). We are mandated by Jesus to go

into the World. (John 20:21) How will we know who needs our extra coat (Luke 3:11) or support if we never look out beyond ourselves?

I wonder what we might do. I wonder if someone in our congregation is already engaged in this issue and might inform us and bring some of us along? Could we get information from Sandy Hook Promise and post the signs of 10 Critical Warning Signs of Violence around the church? Could we host suicide prevention awareness programs such as Soul Shop for the community? What are your thoughts? While we can't do everything, we all can do something.

I close with a poem written attributed to "Martin Niemöller (1892-1984), Lutheran Minister and early Nazi supporter who was later imprisoned for opposing Hitler's regime.

First they came for the Socialists, and I did not speak out-

Because I was not a Socialist.

Then they came for the Trade Unionists, and I did not speak out—

Because I was not a Trade Unionist.

Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out—

Because I was not a Jew.

Then they came for me—

and there was no one left to speak for me.

These are our children, our brothers and sisters who are being shot in our streets, schools. and community. Let us speak out as our faith instructs us. God didn't allow the crucifixion of Jesus to have the last word, but turned that act upside down and gives new life to those who believe. As God empowered the first disciples to share the resurrection news, giving hope and changing the world for the better, may we be empowered with the Holy Spirit to find solutions to keep our communities safe. Let us be angry enough to move, to stand for justice, and work for the common good of all.

And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Philippians 4:7
