Greetings of Grace and Peace!

November is a busy month. It contains All Saint's Sunday, Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving, and this year, the first Sunday of Advent, which is the beginning of the Christian year and our journey towards Christmas. We will have a craft fair on November 12th (we are seeking crafts, items for a raffle table, and asking members to volunteer for at least one hour), our "*Thanks-Giving*" Sunday Pledge Sunday followed by our traditional turkey soup luncheon, Bible study, book study, Spiritual Healing Classes, game night, movie night (Noah), and more. Wow! There is a lot on our church calendar. We will need help and participation from ALL our members to accomplish and be successful in all that is planned. Being hospitable is attending the events that other members have planned. It provides support and encouragement.

For myself, and in speaking with some of you, I know I am not alone; there seems to be a *fog of gloom* covering us. The war in Ukraine, threats of nuclear power and nuclear drills from foreign countries, school shootings, inflation, political tensions on the rise within our own country, global warming, personal health issues, grief, disgruntled church members, apathy, onset of winter and shortened hours of daylight, and the list goes on.

For November, I have decided to take up a spiritual practice that has assisted me in the past in cultivating a more positive, hope-filled, thankful heart. I invite you to join me, even if you are not in the *fog of gloom* I mentioned above.

Each day, write down 10 things that you are thankful for and a short (or long if you want to) reason why you feel that way. Sounds easy, right? However, for the thirty (30) day practice, you **cannot repeat** an item. As you move through the month, you will find yourself giving thanks for things you often take for granted. Perhaps on day 17, you might give thanks for the can opener to open the can of soup for lunch. That thankfulness will carry over through your memory each time you reach for the can opener for many months. Don't think this is foolish. It will be relatively easy for the first days or weeks, but as you continue through the 30 days to the end of the month, you will remember to give thanks for the small, insignificant things we all take for granted (toilet paper?), but truly are a blessing in our lives.

Have some fun with it. Challenge you family or friends to participate. Gather once a week and share what things you have put on each of your lists. Give thanks for others sharing with you, because after naming 295 things you are grateful for, you might need a friend's idea to add to your list. Let me know if you are participating. Share with others if the practice has helped. Perhaps write a short article of the impact it made in your life for an upcoming newsletter. Let's have a coffee hour conversation to hold one another accountable. Pastors need being held accountable and encouragement also.

Let us live as the thank-filled people we are as Christians: for we have a God, that so loved the world that s/he came to live among us in the one called Jesus and gives us his/her own Spirit that we might be able to live, love, laugh, learn, serve, and work together to bring God's Kin-dom here on earth.

May it be so.

Kids Ministry Corner

Living in God's Light Love Jesus Grow in Faith Change the World!

Each Sunday morning, the children take their places in the Sanctuary as fellow congregants with the adults. We have moved from the "sideways" front pews to the forward-facing front pews, to give the children a better view of the altar, Pastor Pat, and the screen, and to physically better integrate them into the congregation. We've also provided large-print bulletins for them to follow along with their fellow congregants, as they are able. It's important for them to know and feel that we are all walking together on our communal spiritual journey, regardless of our differences in age (or any other perceived "difference"). These small changes have had a big impact in tying in our "Seeking God Together" curriculum: we can talk together about the significance of each part of the worship service, the Christ candle, the altarscape, the pastor's "job" in Worship, and our "job" as congregants.

After we leave the Sanctuary and return to our room, we light our own (LED) Christ candle, share our opening prayer, and transition to our Bible verse and story.

Our whole time together is a time of worship, drawing us into a closer relationship with one another, and our Creator: wondering and exploring (outside and inside) through discussion, movement activities, art and sensory activities, and building our "Creation Station" with natural elements we find here or at home.

Right now, we are also working on two songs (they love music !) we hope to share with you in Worship in the coming weeks. Every week, the innocence and open hearts of these kids demonstrate that "Children are a gift from God; they are his reward" (Psalm 127: 3).

Please keep the children, their families, and our Children/Youth Faith Formation ministry in your prayers.

Follow up Thoughts on our Oct 2nd Conversation regarding Inclusivity

Dear Friends,

On Oct. 2, we began our congregational discussion of "inclusivity"; it was a good, open discussion outlining our fears, as well as our hopes and dreams. Thank you to all who participated. While these discussions have currently been prompted by differing perspectives on same-sex issues within the entire United Methodist Church, the discussion has been going on within the wider universal Church for 50 years. Personally, I believe the larger issue is who do we say we are, as a congregation professing to follow Jesus? For those of us who call ourselves "Christians" our spiritual and emotional nourishment is grounded in love: the kind of love that Jesus continually preached about, and lived out during his short ministry: healing, restorative love that unconditionally extends empathy and compassion to all fellow human beings. It reflects God's active, unconditional, and unearned love for us and all of Creation, and calls us to desire, and be willing to work for, the well-being of "the other".

In Matthew 22: 36-39, Jesus gives us "The Greatest Commandment": "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind". This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself"" Not just the neighbors we know, not just the neighbors we like, not just the neighbors we approve of, not just the neighbors we believe deserve it; Jesus offers no conditions or qualifications; he calls us to love all neighbors, all others, as he did, and as God does.

Then, in verse 40, he says, "All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." Jesus distills the Law of the entire Hebrew scriptures (our Old Testament) down to this two-fold

commandment to *love*. Ultimately, all the rules and directives in the Law flow from the ideas of loving God and loving others. Jesus, through his ministry, affirms this; he confirms this in Matthew 5:17: "*Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them.*"

In the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 7:12) Jesus tells us, "So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets.".

If we accept that Jesus was Divine, God among us, came to model us how we are to be in relationship with our Creator, with Creation, and with one another, then are we not required to live and walk in Jesus' teachings? And if Jesus teaches that our entire beings are to be grounded in his love, does it not follow that we are called to shape a congregational culture and ministry in which the touchstone for decisions and actions is the love he taught and modeled?

The larger question I believe we are facing as a church is: do we identify as a people of love, or don't we? Are we willing to claim, and proclaim, that identity, or aren't we? If we are a people of love, then we'll be willing to act accordingly, to uphold and safeguard the well-being of every person in our congregation, and of every person in our community and beyond -period.

This is my own perspective; It's not a political, partisan, "woke" or trendy position. It's based on Jesus' words and actions, and I can't yet find any Gospel Scripture that overrides them.

We'll continue our communal conversation when we gather for our annual Budget Meeting in December. In the meantime, I hope you will pray, talk further with Pastor Pat and other members, and use the interim time to discern where your hearts lie.
